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
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THE FOUNDING INSPIRATION FOR SACRED HOOP MAGAZINE IN 1993

From the Editor



This edition of Sacred Hoop is again eight pages larger than normal, mostly because I wanted to make room for our first article, about the last days of the Standing Rock Water Protector Camps. It's a very long article, but I really felt its story needed to be told. It sets the main theme for this issue of Hoop too, our relationship with the Sacred Hoop of Life - from which of course this magazine takes its name.

Our relationship with Life also includes our relationship with the dead, and our next article is about how to build connections to the ancestors.

We come from the ancestors in crossing the threshold into this 'earth walk'; and begin our path to being human. But becoming an adult, especially in our crazy twisted Western culture, is not easy, so we look at the need for initiation in our next item.

Ancient traditions help with our connection, help us know who we are, give us something to cling to in the sea of changes around us. One such tradition is the magical and mystical Welsh custom of the Mari Lywd, the horse skull dancer of the year's turning.

To many Native Americans, the sacred pipe is the centre of their culture, and so we have a series of articles about the chanupa, the sacred pipe. Arvol Looking Horse is the keeper of the Sacred Calf Pipe, brought to the people by White Buffalo Calf Woman, and he has much to say about the state of the world. We look at the sacred stone used to make the pipe bowl, and then explore the ceremony of the sacred pipe. We finish this section with words from a Diné (Navaho) woman who speaks from her heart about the way humans are letting down their place on the Sacred Hoop of Life, and how this dishonours us at this time.

The path of a human being is difficult, we are not born human beings, we are born two-leggeds, we have to learn to become a human being and the way is hard. The way of a shaman is even harder and our next article tries to give a little reality and sound advice about that particular path.

And we end with a short remembering of two human beings, Chuck Derby, the caretaker of the sacred pipe stone quarries, and his friend the Oglala medicine man, Ed MaGaa.

May we all seek to walk an honourable path with all our relatives.
